You or your group are matched to a specific survivor you will be helping.

Everyone involved will be changing the course of history for these elderly survivors of the Shoah. This is the last generation of Holocaust Survivors and you are the last generation that can help them. Right now, all across Eastern Europe elderly Holocaust survivors are still suffering, in need of food, heat and medication. You can change all that by participating in the *I SAVED A LIFE* program. Our goal is to provide each survivor with \$1800 a year. This is less than \$5.00 a day, yet it will change their lives for the better, providing the care they so desperately need.

The nature of this project is transformative: 100 individuals or groups will save 100 lives, and experience what it truly means to act with compassion and change the world.

Currently The Survivor Mitzvah Project has supported over 2000 elderly survivors in Belarus, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Moldova, Slovakia, Ukraine, and parts of Russia.



"I Saved A Life" will help survivors like Yudel (at left), now paralyzed by a stroke, who as a teenager watched as his family was murdered by their Lithuanian neighbors, or Mera (at right) and her sister Beba, both ill and in need of aid: heating fuel for the winter, lifesaving medications, and nutritious food. As children they survived during the siege of Stalingrad.





Galya (at left), bedridden, is in desperate need of 24 hour care. Rita (at right), who is a child survivor of the concentration camp Pechora (pictured with Zane Buzby and guide Liudmila Makedonskaya during SMP's 2010 Emergency Aid Expedition) is ill and alone and in great need of help for herself and the other 5 child survivors she cares for.
