And so we give, and so we go. Thanks to you, The Survivor Mitzvah Project has been delivering direct and continuous financial aid to elderly Holocaust survivors in Eastern Europe since 2001. In addition to life-giving care, the other essential things they need to survive are love and friendship. So from the beginning, The Survivor Mitzvah Project has been delivering friendship and love in our letters...

"A letter from distant America is not just a letter, not just paper. It is like a delicate web from planet Earth, that is not visible, but pulls toward itself the Jews of the Earth...Even in your most vivid dreams, you can't imagine how much of the Elixir of Life there is for me in your letters."

"Friendship is the best and most precious thing, it heals all illness, especially when one is alone...Your letter is like a breath of fresh air for me. Other than you, no one writes letters to me... I am amazed that there are such wonderful people as you. I hold on only to this."

... and in person. We have traveled all over Eastern Europe: to Lithuania, Belarus, Slovakia, Moldova, Latvia and Ukraine. We've driven thousands of miles, to cities, towns, and remote villages. We bring loving kindness and your desperately needed dollars to use for medicine and surgeries.

"I remember the warmth of your hands, your blindingly wonderful smile and I am grateful that there are people who understand that human relationships are the most important thing in the world..."

"Thanks to your organization, The Survivor Mitzvah Project, I stay alive and didn't become blind."

After all they have been through, life is still such an unfair challenge for them, the unluckiest generation. Each in their 80s and 90s, they are frail, exhausted, and in failing health.

"Because of my health condition (I am blind) I must stay indoors. Mainly I sit in my rocking chair. I think a lot about everything. I think about you, such remarkable people. I thank you all again and again!"

"I am desolate and lonely, old and in poor health. Not having a single good friend with whom to speak intimately and unburden my broken suffering heart."











These trips have been life changing and life giving for these isolated survivors, touching the human spirit.

"If I could see you once more, look again in your kind eyes that became so dear to me – that would be the best gift I could imagine in my life."

"Thank you so much that you do not forget me, and help me out even though the times are hard for everybody...I often reread your letters and I feel better, because you exist.... you are the best thing in my life and I am so grateful to you for the warmth, kindness and support you give me."

"My dear friends, not in any fairytale could I imagine that in my old age I would have so many kind friends that will take part in my life..."

And so we go there. We look at their photographs. We listen to their stories...

"A photograph of my grandparents is all that remains of my life from before the war, although I don't know a thing about them. Who they were, where they lived, what they did, how they laughed, and whom they cried over ..."

"There is nobody left in my life. I am alone, all my relatives died. Germans killed them all ..."

"The Nazis left me lonely and wounded. I was the youngest in the family ... They all were murdered, brutally. My mother with all the old ones was buried alive."

"They murdered all our family leaving me forlorn on the dark bloodied land. We lost everything and everyone..."

"The month of June is very emotional for me as on the 22nd the fascists started war. They bombed my village and on that first day I lost my youth, my closest friends, my home...."

They wait for our letters and long for our visits...

"...Finally I will see you. I feel so happy that I managed to live long enough to see that beautiful day!!"

"Time is passing, years are flying..., and we would like to see you and to tell you looking into your eyes. Thank you very much for everything you do for us ... Our love to all our American friends...Finally we received your letter, which brought joy and calmness into our house."

"Your last letter gives us power and happiness... If on the other side of the Universe somebody remembers and cares about you, then it is worth it to live, and to wait for the precious letters..."

We go because these are members of our family and they need us.

"Hello, my dears, the closest people I have on earth...I am still under the effect of our meeting. I wasn't able to imagine that such a thing was possible. You are so good to people. Not once was there a hint from you that you were not accustomed to such living conditions. Thank you! All of you, my faraway friends from America, may G-d protect you. You have lengthened my own life ..."

"I couldn't exist without your help. You are with me every day and my heart is always with you."

We bring anything we can think of that can help make their lives a little brighter.



"...The gift from you, the beautiful Magen Dovid! Thank you very much, thank you..."

"Thank you so much, especially for the menorah that I did not see since my childhood..."
